The first step is being mindful of pronoun usage. Here are a few tips to get you moving in the right direction.

- Don't use the word 'preferred' before pronouns. Doing so gives the impression that they are optional.
- Avoid assumptions about which pronoun a person may use. We can't guess based on someone's appearance or name.
- If you are unsure, opt for a gender-neutral pronoun.
 (e.g. The student in the back row is your partner.
 See if 'they' want to join you in the lab.)
- It's OK to ask which pronoun someone uses. You may introduce yourself by including your pronouns. (e.g. Hi, I'm Emma. I go by 'she, her, hers.' What pronouns do you use?)
- Avoid using gender-specific phrases like 'Yes, ma'am,' 'ladies and gentlemen,' and 'you guys.'
- If you make a mistake with someone's pronoun, say you're sorry and move on. There's no need to over apologize. That will only make someone more uncomfortable. Strive to get it correct next time.
